- PARK CLOSURES; Griffith Observatory, Greek Theatre, carousel, Autry Museum, train rides, Travel Town, Wonderview/Burbank trail to Wisdom Tree remain closed as does the LADOT DASH service to the Observatory. The Griffith Parkline is suspended. Pony rides opening back up soon.
- The Los Angeles Zoo is open! Playgrounds are open! Exercise area is open!
- The next Griffith Park Advisory meeting scheduled November 19, 2020 at 6:30pm via zoom. Link to join can be found on the agenda which is always posted on the Griffith Park webpage 72hours prior to a scheduled meeting. The public is always welcome and encouraged to join meetings and participate in public comment. Your voice matters.
- Do you know that Recreation and Parks (RAP) is responsible for the Mass Care Branch for the City of Los Angeles during an

emergency? Amidst the pandemic, RAP had mobilized to set up and operate 24 emergency shelters, 2 trailer shelter locations, childcare services for essential workers and 24 hour maintenance services ensuring a safe environment for all Angelinos involved. RAP still continues to assist around the clock response to every aspect of emergency operations within the department. We are proud of our team who have risen to the challenges of responding to this crisis and being first responders.

We are now in a fiscal crisis due to the pandemic. There is a hiring freeze, no new employees will be hired and many staff will be taking early retirement. This will leave the city parks short staffed for the next fiscal year. There will be no new projects at this time that have not previously been awarded to a contractor or that is not urgent. RAP will continue to maintain the park as we always have. Maintenance staff is among the hardest working and most attentive in the City of Los Angeles.


